

WELCOME FESTIVAL DIARY

July is Cambridge **Summer Music month!**

After the huge success of last year's Festival, we are thrilled to present thirty events across July. We welcome a host of international artists and ensembles to the historic venues of Cambridge and beyond.



Celebrations abound in this year's programme. One of the world's finest chamber orchestras, the Academy of St Martin in the Fields this season salutes the centenary of their founder, Sir Neville Marriner. They bring their signature sound to our Mozart Celebration (27th July). JS Bach's St John Passion celebrates its 300th anniversary in 2024, and so we welcome English Voices and the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment to perform under our Honorary Patron, Timothy Brown (11th July). CV Stanford (who died in 1924 and whose music is intrinsically linked to Cambridge) is celebrated by the Choir of Clare College (5th July) and Anthony Gritten (13th July). It's a Happy 40th Birthday to The Crouch End Festival Chorus, who bring Duke Ellington to the Chapel of King's College (20th July). The **Gesualdo Six** have reached their tenth anniversary and return to the Festival with the music of Josquin (25th July). Choral lovers can also hear the combined forces of Gabrieli Roar at Ely Cathedral, in Verdi's monumental Requiem (24th July).

We also celebrate new partnerships, particularly with institutions who support the next generation of musicians. We're proud to be working with the **Lang Lang Foundation** (13th July) to present a concert given by their first ever UK Scholars. We'll hear chamber music from musicians selected by the Young Classical Artists Trust (11th and 18th July) and the BBC New Generation Artists scheme (4th and 26th July) as well as established and rising stars such as guitarist Sean Shibe (19th July), pianist Jeneba Kanneh-Mason (12th July) and the **Heath Quartet** (18th July). British baritone **Huw Montague Rendall** joins forces with song accompanist extraordinaire Graham Johnson (26th July) for an unmissable performance of Schubert's Die Schöne Müllerin. With five Sounds Green events returning to the Botanic Garden every Wednesday, opera and folk music at Childerley Hall and much more, there is something for everyone to enjoy this summer. I look forward to welcoming you all.





These outstanding young artists celebrate the influence of ancient Greek culture on French Romanticism, with a focus on the poetry of the Parnassian poets, especially Leconte de Lisle.

The concert features works by Fauré, Debussy and Hahn, as well as Greek folk songs in settings by Konstantinidis and Giannidis, which show the influence travelled in both directions. These flow beautifully into Ravel's Cinq Mélodies Populaires Grecques (Five Greek Songs), which Alexandra will sing in Greek.

In 2023 Alexandra Achillea Pouta won the Guildhall School's Music Gold Medal, the School's most prestigious music prize for outstanding musicians.

Edward Picton-Turbervill completed a Master's in Piano Accompaniment at the Guildhall in July 2023, and now works in London as a freelance pianist, organist and composer.








Organ Recital: Celebrating Stanford

The Heath Quartet was formed in 2002 at the Royal Northern College of Music. They were selected for representation by YCAT, awarded a Borletti-Buitoni Special Ensemble Scholarship and in 2012 won the Ensemble Prize at the Festspiele Mecklenburg-Vorpommern where they are now regular visitors. In 2016 they won the Gramophone Chamber Award for their recording of the complete string quartets of Sir Michael Tippett, and in May 2013 became the first ensemble in fifteen years to win the prestigious Royal Philharmonic Society's Young Artists Award. Their programme includes Ravel's only string quartet - one of the most widely performed chamber works and often considered to be his first masterpiece - and Tippett's second quartet, notable for its abundant lyricism and lithe, dancing rhythms.

Kathryn Tickell is the foremost exponent of the Northumbrian pipes; a composer, performer, educator and successful recording artist with many releases to her name, whose work is deeply rooted in the landscape and people of Northumbria. Named after the old Northumbrian word for twilight, 'The Darkening' is made up of four musicians based in North East England: Kathryn Tickell (Northumbrian smallpipes, fiddle, vocals), Amy Thatcher (accordion, synth, clogs, vocals), Kieran Szifris (octave mandolin), Joe Truswell (drums, percussion); with Josie Duncan from the Isle of Lewis (vocals, clarsach). Together these dazzling musicians create musical magic, exploring the connecting threads of music, landscape and people over a period of almost 2000 years.

After their recent acclaimed performances of *Elijah* and *Dream of Gerontius*, Gabrieli returns to Ely Cathedral to perform Verdi's much-loved Requiem.



Courts in Renaissance Europe were vital meeting places for the great composers of the time, as they travelled considerable distances to seek patronage and pedagogy. In 1503, Josquin des Prez began a year-long tenure as Maestro di Cappella at the Este Court in Ferrara.

This programme explores how echoes of songs and motets from the courts of Margaret of Austria and Anne of Brittany may have travelled with Josquin and his contemporaries via Ferrara to inspire Carlo Gesualdo's compositions at his court in the hills east of Naples a century later.

Highlights include two responses to the Lamentations of Jeremiah by La Rue and Brumel, alongside a work by Indian-American composer, Shruthi Rajasekar, commissioned by The Gesualdo Six, as well as pieces by Josquin and Gesualdo.

The internationally acclaimed Academy of St Martin in the Fields join forces with the Academy of English Voices and star soloist Martin James Bartlett in a fitting Festival Finale. Festival Director Ben Johnson conducts an all-Mozart programme beginning with the eight-year-old Mozart's E-Flat Symphony, composed in London in 1764, and concluding with his Requiem, left incomplete on Mozart's deathbed in 1791.

The K. 482 Piano Concerto was composed at the end of 1785. Using clarinets in the orchestra for the first time, Mozart particularly impresses with the lyrical passages in the slow sections of the concerto, which were well received by the audience at the first performance. Indeed, his father, Leopold, reports in a letter that Mozart "had to repeat" the Andante immediately. An event not to be missed, early booking strongly recommended.

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
